#### NOTICES

New LDS Family History Center Open in Mahwah, NJ— A new LDS Family History Center has opened at 30 Youngs Road, in Mahwah (in the section of Mahwah near Ramsey, Wyckoff, and Franklin Lakes). This location is about 15 or 20 minutes' drive from Suffern and will probably be convenient for many Rockland Co. researchers. The Center's hours are, tentatively, Tues. 9-11 a.m. and 7-10 p.m.; Weds 7-9 p.m.; Thurs. 7-10 p.m.; and Sat. 9 a.m.-1 p.m. It is suggested that prospective users call first at 201-327-1940 to verify hours open.

Northeast Regional Branch of National Archives now in NYC—According to items in the Westchester Genealogical Society newsletter, the NYG&B Newsletter, and various newspapers, the NE Regional Branch of the National Archives is now open at 201 Varick Street, 12th floor, New York City (at the corner of Houston St.). Researchers should use the building entrance on Houston St. and take the elevator to the 12th floor). There is a parking lot next door where you can park all day for \$10.50. Hours are Mon-Fri 8-4:30 and by May they might be open on the 3rd Saturday of each month. Call to check hours before you go (212-337-1300).

Renovation work on the building is still being done, and not all materials have been moved from Bayonne, but the 1920 census on microfilm (with indexes) is there and there are about 2 dozen microfilm readers (with more on order). Because of the

current large numbers of researchers, use of the machines may be limited to 1-1/2 hours at a time.

#### Census Records & Rockland County's Growth

Reprinted and excerpted from Names on Our Land by Peter Krell

On April 1, 1990 some 450,000 workers [took] the 21st decennial (10 year) federal census of an estimated population of 249 million sprawled over 50 states, marking 200 years of these records. Over 85% [was] expected to be handled by mail. Forms [were to be] printed in over 30 languages and individuals [would be able to] call an 800 telephone number for help from an interpreter.

During the night of March 20, there [was to be] a special "Shelter and Street Night" census to track

down the homeless population.

This was in sharp contrast to the first census of 1790. On that first Monday of August some 650 assiatant marshals, largely Revolutionary War veterans, traveled door-to-door from New Hampshire's farms to the swamps of Georgia. They carried only handruled schedules and quill pens.

These first census takers counted free inhabitants

and Indians who were paying taxes. Slaves were counted as three-fifths of a person. These numbers were used to determine congressional representation. Census results were posted in two public places, unlike today's confidential concerns.

One hundred years later there was a new portrait of America. The 1890 census reported that the average worker lived on a farm, and earned \$438 a year. The average household had six children. Consider the fact that pork chops cost 10.7¢ a pound and a 10lb. sack of potatoes sold for 16¢.

Child labor laws had not been passed. This would not occur for over 20 years. Census takers in 1890 listed occupations for children as young as ten years old. Of those persons beyond age 65, it was reported, almost eight out of ten were still working. Today it is

In 1890 census takers were instructed to carefully distinguish between blacks and "mullatoes,

quadroons, and octoroons."

Gas lamps lighted most homes. It would not be until 1925 that about half of our nation's homes would have electricity.

In 1890 only 234,000 homes had a telephone. This was fewer than four out of every thousand people. There were over a million horse-drawn "carriages, buggies, farm wagons and ambulances." Ten years later, when motor vehicle sales were first counted, some 4,100 passenger cars had been sold, costing close to \$1,000 each.

In 1930 the big question on the census was "Do you have a radio?" When the question of inside plumbing was asked in 1940, it was learned that only about half the homes had complete indoor facilities. In 1950 the big question was "Do you own a TV?"

In Rockland the federal census of 1940 revealed the county population had increased 14.477 in ten years, to a population of 74,076. In 1930 the total population had been 59,599.

A considerable portion of the population increase was at the two state institutions, Rockland State and Letchworth. These two had a total count of 9,790. This would make the net growth only 7.86 per cent.

Oscar W. Heinz, project supervisor of the Rockland County Planning Board, had estimated the 1940 population at 70,000. There were some 360 farms. Rockland had some 16,354 occupied dwellings. There were no figures for 1930.

These figures were given for the five towns: Clarkstown, 10,188 to 12,224; Haverstraw, 11,603 to 12,441; Orangetown, 18,209 to 26,533, of which 7,980 were in Rockland State; Ramapo, from 16,321 to 17,980; and Stony Point, from 3,458 to 4,898.

Two villages (Spring Valley at 4,296 and Haverstraw at 5,906) gained strongly. Nyack at 5,196, S. Nyack at 2,078, W. Haverstraw at 2,534,

and Hillburn at 1,163 slumped badly.

Other villages were Suffern at 3,765, Sloatsburg at 1,770, Piermont at 1,872, and Upper Nyack at 923.

Rockland's development began with the opening of the Tappan Zee Bridge on Dec. 15, 1955. There was rapid growth in population and dwelling units during the 1960's and 1970's.

The 1980 census counted Rockland's population at 259,930. Rockland was touted as the third wealthiest county in terms of household income, ranking behind Nassau and Westchester. Average income was \$28,406, compared to Nassau's household income of \$30,791 and Westchester's at \$29,397.

New York's smallest county was discovered by corporations and companies. Factory work, the core of employmnt during the 1960's and 1970's, virtually disappeared. Rockland was called a service employ-

The 1980's are seen as the end of Rockland as a bedroom community. After 35 years of rapid-fire development, urbanization has caught up to Rockland. There is no longer that rural feeling of ten

Ramapo Town, the largest and most diverse town in Rockland with an estimated population [1989-90] of 92,000 has experienced great changes in the past

Between 1983 and 1986 four villages were formed in Ramapo. Two more villages were incorporated in 1990, bringing the town total to 12. Two more were [in 1989-90] being planned.

Supervisor Herbert Reisman started in office with a population estimated at about 7,000. With the formation of Airmont Village, the population rose to

about 20,000 in the unincorporated areas.
