NYC Dutch Reformed Church Records — An article on "Dutch Reformed Records of New York City in the NYG&BS Library" by Harry Macy, Jr. appears in the Spring 1994 issue of The NYG&B Newsletter. The article gives a brief history of Dutch Reformed churches in the city. It also lists the types of records available in the library of the New York Genealogical & Biographical Society and the dates they span for individual churches. Other articles in the informative newsletter issue are "Kings County Records from the St. Francis College Collection Now at the Municipal Archives of the City of New York" by B-Ann Moorhouse, and "New York State Census Microfilms in the NYG&B Library" by Michael Marrone. The NYG&B Library, at 122 East 58th Street, NYC (212-755-8532) is open Tuesday through Saturday from 9:30-5:00 except for legal holidays. It is closed on Mondays and will be closed from August 16 through September 3 in 1994. NYG&B members have full access to the library collection. ✓ 1891 English Census Records —
According to an item in the March 1994 Castle
Genie, the newsletter of the Genealogy Club of the
Passaic County (NJ) Historical Society, The Family
History Library of the Church of Jesus Christ of
Latter-Day Saints recently acquired the 1891 census

of England, Wales, Channel Islands and Isle of Man. The set of 15,000 fiche has been distributed to English-speaking family history centers. To help researchers find the correct microfiche number(s) for a specific parish or town, the British census register has been updated to include the 1891 census.

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Valley, Orange Co. (now in Woodbury Common), died in 1818. Prior to settling in Orange Co., he lived in Lee, MA with his wife and children, was an assessor and surveyor there in 1781. In 1805 he was supervisor of Monroe Township. His son, John Jr., founded the Southfields ME Church in 1848. The Coffey Celtic sept has been traced back to 12th century Ireland, descended from Ith, a royal family of Spain and the royal family of Gaul. The original sept was "Cobhthaigh" meaning "victorious," later modified to O'Cowhig, then Coffey.

The Rockland County phone book lists 25 Coffey subscribers; the Bergen County (NJ) phone book 16!

✓ Nicknames — Do you find different English given names for the same individual? Sometimes a baptismal name was used, sometimes a nickname. Christine Rose, C.G., of the Rose Family Association (CA) has published a book of frequent nicknames that might help you in your searches. For example, Patsy was popular for Martha, Nabby for Abigail. Willie could be any name beginning with Wil. Peter was sometimes used for Patrick. Dolph might be Adolphus or Randolph. Ramapo Mountain families (not in the Rose book) had some favorites — Rette for Loretta, Muz for

Answers to Queries

From Annette L. Burke, 43 Summit Street,

Ridgefield Park, NJ 07660:

I noticed the name Mabie in the section (Answers to Queries." I wonder how many people know that if their name is Mabie, Mabille, etc., they are Van Ordens. The Van Orden (Van Norden) family was founded in Holland by Seigneur Pierre Mabille of France in Naarden, Holland in 1572. Of the six children who eventually came to this country in 1623, only one decided to keep the name Van Naarden — the rest retained Mabille when it was ordered that the Dutch must start to use last names.

I would like to know if there are any others doing Van Norden research. I would be willing to share any information I have for information I need. I work a lot through the [computer] genealogy bulletin board on Prodigy and have connected with Van Nordens in Oregon, California and Texas, to name a few sources. For anyone interested in the Prodigy service, my number is GBRM81A.

To Query No. 46 (this issue) From Robert Protzmann, 4 Ethel Drive, New City, NY 10956

(excerpts from 5 page reply):

I do not believe that anyone knows the parents of Gulian Vigne. The origin of the name Vigne comes from the business of making wine, including the growing of grapes. Its meaning in Old French is

simply, "vine," a vinedresser would be "vigneur."

Jean De la Vigne was the Walloon Domine from

1585-1622 in Amsterdam.

Guleyn (Guylen, Gulyn, Guillaume, Gulian, Willem) Vinge (or Vigne/Vienje/Vinje/De la Vigne/de Vigne) d. < Apr 30, 1632; m. Adrianna (Ariantje, Ariaentje, Adrienne) Cuvilje/Cuilyie/Cuvel/Cevelyn/ Couverille/Cuville(r)/Cuvelier/Cuvellier (d. 1655). They were originally from Valenciennes, in French Flanders (Belgium), but today, part of France, near the Belgian border. They were Protestants, known as Walloons. The names De la Vigne and Cuvelier appear on the lists of the victims of the Spanish Inquisition in Valenciennes, and this accounts for the family's flight to the Netherlands. They were in Amsterdam in 1613. They could have been in Manhattan as early as 1614, with trappers and fur traders, and this is favored by David Vernoot Bennet in The Record, Vol. 90, #1, 1959, p. 2. However it is more likely that they arrived with the first group of colonists, in 1623, on the "New Netherland," under the auspices of the Dutch West India Co. Unfortunately, the records of that voyage have long since vanished.

He had a farm and cabin, on the East River strand, where Wall St. intersects Pearl. This peice of

land went to his son, Jan.

They had a small farm above the wall, east of Broadway, bounded on the south by the King's farm, and on the north by the present Canal St. and on the east by the Vresche (Fresh) Water, later called the Collect Pond, and on the west about the present line f Church St., by the farm of Jan Jansen Damen. This was the well-known Chalkie (or Calk/Kolk) Hook farm, near the site of the Tombs Prison, today.

She was reputed to have played football with an Indian's head, which was brought to New Amsterdam during the Indian War in 1643.

She m. 2 ca. Apr 1632, Jan Jansen Damen/Dam (b. ca. 1607, d. June 18, 1651), son of Jan Cornelisse (Damen) and Fytie/Sophia Martens, of Bunick, on the Rhine, Prov of Utrecht. Damen may be derived from Demen, a hamlet in North Brabant, or may mean son of Adam. He lived first in Brooklyn, before moving to Manhattan, where he was elected one of the Eight Men. He became wealthy. Owned Privateer, "La Garce." He had three brothers, Cornelis Jansen Cuyper, Cornelis Jansen Damen (same?), Willem Jansen Damen, and 3 sisters, Neiltje and Hendrickje.

Resumes of Past Programs at Meetings of the Genealogical Society of Rockland County

How to Prepare, Organize, and File a Genealogy

Program presented by Douglas Renud at the November 23, 1993 meeting of the Genealogical Society of Rockland County

Mr. Renud is currently working on a genealogy. He has lived in Suffern for 26 years and is an electrical engineer. Both of his parents came to this country from Sweden in 1909. He speaks Swedish fluently, making it easy for him to get information from relatives in Sweden. In May, a friend of Helen Hayes asked if she could hire him to do some research; this lady was 94 years old. Her family name was Lofgren, and she really knew very little about her family. He took the following steps:

- 1. He created a pedigree chart with the information she gave him. This chart is used as a work sheet.
- 2. She had told him that she and her brothers and sisters had all attended the same college, so he wrote to the college asking for information. He put a copy of this letter, with the reply, back to back in a plastic sleeve. It was noted that when writing to colleges or universities, the letter should be addressed to the Alumni Office.

He has written to many historical societies, etc., with great results, and also keeps this information in plastic sleeves.

- 3. Since there were five children in the family, he used a looseleaf binder with dividers for each child. In this binder, he also keeps a list of pertinent addresses, phone/fax numbers, etc., so they are always at hand.
- 4. It is a good idea to keep in the binder a log of whom you call or write to, phone calls from someone else to you, how much you spent for mailings, etc.
- 5. Since Ms. Lofgren had two children, Mr. Renus created a sheet $(8-1/2 \times 11)$ which contained four generations (pedigree).
- 6. When he discovered where her parents and grandparents died, he wrote to the Hall of Records in Stockholm to obtain death certificates. He kept them all together in one plastic sleeve.
- 7. Ms. Lofgren's husband was born in Germany. Mr. Renud read through a diary she had given him and discovered he was born in Bremerhaven. Mr. Renud and his wife traveled to Germany, visited Bremerhaven, and obtained quite a bit of information. During the early 1940s, it was necessary that all Germans had to prove they were Aryans. They had to complete a special form showing their descent; these forms show a great deal of information. All documents were in German, which he had to translate.
- 8. He then created a 6-generation pedigree chart (8- $1/2 \times 17$). When the family is so large that it won't fit on this size sheet, you can only put the names on, not other information.
- 9. He then created a gigantic chart on blueprint paper (36 x 24). He sent copies of the charts to relatives to make sure the information is correct.
- 10. Last, but not least, keep a small notebook for daily work no loose scrap paper. ■

Piermont

A community in Rockland County, N.Y., incorporated as the Village of Piermont in 1850. Earlier called Taulman's Landing, Tappan Landing, and Tappan Slote. Named about 1839 (with the building of the N.Y. & Erie Railroad) for the long pier built for the railroad. It was from this very important point on the Hudson River that the produce from the surrounding vicinity, including Tappan, was shipped to the New York markets. Sloops entered the Sparkill at high tide through the Slote, so called from its resemblance to a ditch. Starting about 1827, steamboats took the place of the earlier sloops.
