It is broken down by community, and provides detailed property boundaries on lots purchased in the late 19th through early 20th centuries. The New City Library acquired this item through an estate auction, and will be returning it to the County Clerk's Office, where it properly belongs. In return, we will receive a microfilmed copy of the index, as well as a microfilmed copy of the master index. I contacted the State Bureau of Vital Statistics. enclosing a copy of his parents' church and civil marriage documents. They sent me a very brief form to fill out and have notarized stating that, upon its receipt, they would amend the certificate and send me a certified copy of the corrected document.

If this can prove to be of help to one person in search for his or her heritage, I'll feel that I have contributed something.

Peter Vreeland (Freeland in 1800s) 10 Dec 1780 Hackensack, NJ, d. 12 July 1850 Pompton, NJ. Family lived in Hackensack during Revolutionary War and she received Widow's Pension W18226. Peter d. 28 Nov 1827 - interred Little Ferry, NJ. Sons: Hessell, Isaac William, Samuel, Marcus, John, Peter, Nicholas. Daughters: Elizabeth and Eva (who m. Isaac Schoonmaker). 55. WARDELL/WANDELL, CONKLIN — I am interested in the connection of the Wardell/Wandell/Wondell/Wandle family with the Concklin family.

Ezekial Concklin of Pomona (he died in 1811) had a daughter Hannah who married James Wardell. I noted somewhere that John Wardell moved from Tappan to Haverstraw Twp. in 1794.

William G. Conklin b. ca. 1820 (I'm searching for his parents) married Sabrina Hattie Wright, daughter of Francis Wright and Esther/Hester Conklin — lived in the vicinity of Ladentown.

Their son Francis (Frank) had a son Jacob Wordell Conklin. Is there a connection?

Conklins in the Tappan/Palisades area married Wandelin and Wandelingeo — probably the same? Is there a Wandel genealogy? My chief objective is to find the parents of William G. Conklin — his mother might have been a Wandel. Hannah & James had at least one daughter, Melissa. William died in the Civil War.

Was William G. Conklin (1820-1863) of Ladentown related to the Wandel/Wardell family? His wife was Sabrina Wright. He had a grandson Jacob Wordell Conklin. Hannah Conklin, daughter of Ezekial Conklin (d. 1811) and first wife Catherine Johnson, married James Wardell.

Answers to Queries

❖ From Marjorie Smeltzer Stevenot, 150 Johnsontown Road, Sloatsburg, NY 10974, re: Query No. 33, May 1994 —

Jesse Trenchard of Yonkers married Phoebe (Phemije) Concklin of Palisades 26 July 1823, Tappan RDC #207. Phoebe was born Jan 24, 1801, bp. Mar 4 Tappan #3451; d. Mar 30, 1827 age 25; br Gesner Burying Ground.

I suggest you look for the Trenchard family in Yonkers, Palisades, and the Gesner Burying Ground.

Children of Phoebe and Jesse baptised at Tappan were: Elizabeth Ann Trenchard and Phoebe Maria Trenchard, both b. Sept 3, 1825, bp. July 9, 1826; and Peter Henry Trenchard, b. Mar 27, d. May 13, 1827 (Note Phebe died 3 days later). Jesse Trenchard may have married again.

❖ From Laura J. LeBarron, 23 Clover Street, Yonkers, NY 10703, re: Query No. 23, May 1993 —

Mary (Perry) Snedeker was the daughter of Harmanus Perry (1769-1829) and Annatje [Hannah] Mannel (1768-1853). Her siblings were: Sarah Perry (1795-ca 1870) wife of George Tremper (my ancestors); Elizabeth Perry (1797-1887) wife of Nicholas Meyers; John H. Perry (1799-1855) husband of Jemima Vanderbilt; William H. Perry (1802-1886) husband of Ann Tice; Daniel H. Perry (1804-?) husband of Sarah -?-; and Hannah Perry (1806-1885) wife of Abraham Snyder.

You may not have made the connection to this family because of the difference in dates of birth from baptismal records (22 May 1793) and the gravestone inscriptions (22 May 1795). I believe an error was made when the inscriptions were copied (a 3 mistaken for a 5) or that the date on the stone itself is incorrect (I have not yet seen the stone myself). The deed and will referenced clearly show that Mary (nickname Polly) wife of Garret Snedecker was the child of Harmen Perry and wife Hannah.

I'm interested myself in corresponding with anyone working on the Perry and Mannel lines.

❖ From Marjorie Smeltzer Stevenot, 150 Johnsontown Road, Sloatsburg, NY 10974, re: Query No. 35, May 1994 —

The 1854 map of Rockland Co. shows Mrs. Allen located on Johnsontown Road, about two miles from Route 17, Sloatsburg. This may the farmhouse purchased by Tom Donovan in 1866 from Eber Smith. I'm still tracing prior owners. The house is believed to date from 1760. I suggest you check the 1850 Federal Census for Ramapo Twp., Rockland Co. for a possible widow and children.

In an earlier letter to you I noted that a Mr. Allen married Henrietta Sloat of Sloatsburg — her first husband. They had a daughter Mary born May 1, 1900. She married Harrison O. Bush, a communicant of St. Johns of Greenwood (now Arden) on the Harriman estate. Both died in 1955 and are buried in St. Johns-in-the-Wilderness.

(Harriman State Park.) Henrietta Sloat Allen's second husband was Robert Reeves, who prchased a 110-acre tract — I believe the same property — about 1905.

Two Allens are buried at Old St. Mary's on-the-hill, Arden. This is a Roman Catholic cemetery. Mary Allen died 8/24/1871; Michael Allen died 6/21/1871.

Peter Krell died of a heart attack Thursday, May 5, 1994 at Nyack Hospital, Nyack, NY.

As one of its most active organizers and a Charter Member of the Genealogical Society of Rockland County, Peter served as its treasurer from 1985-1994. He was a local historian, author, and leader in the fight to preserve old and abandoned graveyards. He was an active member of many organizations in the county. He was a long-time member of the Board of Directors of the Historical Society of Rockland County, Recording Secretary of the Historians Roundtable, a writer and researcher of local history, and a contributor to three local weekly newspapers.

For the genealogical researchers of the county, one of the most important of Peter's achievements was the book he compiled as Chairman of the Committee for the Preservation of Rockland Cemeteries, "So That All May Be Remembered," Volume I, Clarkstown Cemeteries. There were to be volumes for each of the townships.

Among the many tributes to Peter was one by Thomas F. X. Casey, former president of the Historical Society, and County Historian, which speaks for the majority: "The death of Peter is a great loss for us all. He was always concerned for things outside himself, and he gave selflessly to everyone."

INDENTURE. A deed or written agreement.

GRANTOR. The seller of property. Usually includes the given name of the seller's wife. She was "examined" separately to make certain she agreed to forfeit her dower rights.

GRANTEE. The buyer of property.

DOWER RIGHTS. The portion of a deceased husband's

real property allowed to his widow during her lifetime. Many wills revoked these rights if she remarried.

PART OF THE FIRST PART. The seller.

PARTY OF THE SECOND PART. The buyer.

TENAMENTS. Dwelling homes.

APPURTENANCES. Other structures — barns, sheds, etc.

PUBLIC AUCTION. Sold to divide an estate. Names of the heirs usually noted.

CHAINS, PERCHES. A surveyor's measuring device. A chain of 100 links (of uniform size) equaled 66 feet. A perch equaled one rod.

COMPASS READING (YEAR). The magnetic needle, which points north, varies with the rotation of the earth on its axis.

TREE MARKERS. Hardwood trees were preferred as they were calculated to last several hundred years.

PATENT. Title to public lands conveyed by the government.

REGISTRATION OF **DEEDS** was not required until 1830. Some deeds were registered later to secure a mortgage. ■

Potake

Also Pothat. Early Indian name for the body of water later called Negro Pond and for the vicinity that became Sloatsburg. NY.

Quaspeck

Indian name for present Rockland Lake at Haverstraw in Orange (later Rockland) County, N.Y. Also written Quashpeake. The Indian word may mean"Black Pond."

Ramapo

There are at least two locations that used this old Indian name, both taking their name from that of the river of the

same name. There are various spellings of this Indian word, which is said to mean "clear or sweet water," or "river of many round ponds."
