#### N.Y. STATE LIBRARY TO GO ON-LINE

The New York State Board of Regents recently announced their desire to create a "virtual library," which would give local library users Internet access to a state wide network of databases, photographs, maps, and rare documents from the State Library and numerous private databases. The proposed system would link libraries across the state electronically. Access would be free. New York residents would sign on using an "e-library" card obtained through local libraries. The Regents will ask the Legislature to come up with twelve million dollars to create the system.

Both John and Rachel and three of their adult children are buried in the North Madison Cemetery, Madison Township, OH. Three other children were first interred in Greenwood Cem., Brooklyn, NY, and were later moved to Oak Hill Cem., Nyack. They are: William Adrian Tallman, b.30 Jan

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1854, d.7 Aug 1856, in Brooklyn, moved to OakHill 17 Aug 1869; Lucy Schultz **Tallman**, b. 6 Feb 1856, died in Brooklyn of Scarlet Fever, 22 Feb 1859, moved to OakHill 17 Aug 1869; Evelyne **Tallman**, b. C/ 27 Sept to 4 Oct 1861, d. In Brooklyn of Scarlet Fever, 4 Mar 1863. (Address at death was Downing St, near Gatesam, Ward 7, Brooklyn.) Moved to OakHill 17 Aug 1869. Why would three children, dead and buried for 6 to 15 years, be moved from Greenwood Cemetery to OakHill Cemetery. It is a puzzle which escapes me. Conjecture is welcome.

December 19- Terrible accident on the Erie railway near Suffern. William **Calhoun**, the engineer, and his son George **Calhoun**, fireman, both thrown on the track by the escape of steam from a hole in the boiler, the latter instantly killed, the former died on the following day.

December 22- Coroners inquest at Haverstraw on the body of Hugh **Gorman**, who died suddenly at the Wayne Hotel, of disease of the heart.

## Postal Information. Did you know ???

- \* <u>Typed</u> envelopes will reach addresses one day earlier than hand written ones.
- \* <u>Postal machine scanners</u> read envelopes from the bottom up, starting with the zip code. If anything is lower than the zip the letter will be held up until it can be manually sorted. Mail will reach its destination at least a day sooner if you use zip codes, and using the additional 4 digit number is even better.
- \* <u>Self addressed Stamped Envelopes</u> (SASE) folded inside a letter is a violation of postal regulations because they jam the sorting machines. It is best to use an unfolded #9 envelope inside a #10 business envelope.

#### VIOLA HOME OF JACOB YOUNG

The mansion, on West Maple Ave., was estimated by the late Claire Tholl as built about 1800. She said it resembled the 200 year old William Smith house of Haverstraw. Noted architect Leland Richard Meyers speculated that the original part of the house was built in the late 1700's or early 1800's. Mrs. Irma Dempster, (deceased), a granddaughter of Jacob, believed that he had built the house. However, since Jacob was born in 1813 and married in 1837, it is more likely that he remodeled or added to the existing house.

The names of Jacob's children are painted on the wall of the carriage house, on the wall of the barn, and in the summer kitchen. A few years ago the present owners, Mr. & Mrs. Erickson, put new walls on the kitchen, covering the initials, but left exposed the original tree beams with their bark still on. The names can still be seen in the barn, behind an old door.

Jacob Young was a grandson of Hendrick Young (Heinrich Jung, a German palatine who emigrated at age six), and Annatje Hannah Osborn. Jacob was secretary of the Dutch Church and occupied pew #45. He seceded from the church with Dominie Demarest and joined the True Reformed Church on West Maple Ave. His wife was Jane Ackerson Ramsey, adopted daughter of Peter Ramsey and Alida Young

For some years Jacob operated a grocery in Viola. When he moved to Spring Valley, before 1874, the house was purchased by John W. Brown of Brooklyn, and then inherited by his son Halloran, who died childless in 1953. A photo of the house taken by the Browns shows Victorian gingerbread ornamenting the long front porch. A fragment of the scrollwork was found in the basement of the Lehmberg home on Viola Rd., a house once owned by Jacob's son Alfred, and grandson Raymond.

When Brown was no longer able to farm, P.E. Erickson bought the property and gave him a life right. The Ericksons have renovated the house, replacing rotted boards and making other changes necessary for modern living.

The house may have been begun, or purchased, by Jacob's father, Tunis Young. Tunis was born in 1772 and married Mary Frederick in 1799. In his will, Tunis ordered the property to be divided and sold. Some was purchased by his sons. The house and farm were on the tax rolls in 1807 and 1812.

All of Jacob's children were born in the West Maple Avenue house. Son Alfred built two houses on Viola Road in Mechanicsville- one as his residence, the other, as a patriotic gesture, for use as an armory by his unit during the Civil War. Alfred served in the 17th New York Militia, and his regiment was called for guard duty in Baltimore for a few months, but never saw action. A historic plaque was placed on the house in 1899. For a time the house was used as a manse by the Dutch Church, and then bought back by Alfred's son Raymond

Alfred Young was married to Amelia VanBlarcom, daughter of the first mayor of Paterson, NJ. Amelia came to Rockland County to teach in the Dutch Church school. She died in 1879, one month short of her thirty eighth birthday.

Jacob Young died in 1902 at age 88. His children were: Alfred (1838-1906)- m. Amelia VanBlarcom.

## Early Immigration and Historical Ships By Norman Brouwer, South Street Seaport

Program presented at the May 25, 1999 meeting of the Genealogical Society of Rockland County.

The South Street Seaport in New York City has a research library and archives consisting of 20,000 volumes, as well as business papers, plans of ships, photographs, marine paintings, etc. The Seaport also has the collection of the Seaman's Bank for Savings.

People from all over the world send inquiries by mail, telephone, e-mail, and also walk in during the week. The Staff is all volunteer, with the exception of Mr. Brouwer. If you plan to visit, it is a good idea to call ahead. Most of the inquiries concern immigration, but sometimes are about ancestors who worked on ships or who operated businesses at the South Street Seaport.

Very few immigrants returned to the "old country." The largest immigrant groups were the Irish and Germans in the 1800's. New York was the center for most things having to do with shipping. The Hudson River was a great natural advantage, and the Hudson valley became the hinterland for goods to be produced and then shipped out of the port of New York. In addition, the Erie Canal opened the whole interior of the State of New York. From 1815 to the beginning of the Civil War, the Port of New York really "took off." Over one half the goods coming into the country were passed through New York.

Immigration had its peaks and valleys. One of the peaks was during the late 1840's, the "potato famine." There were also revolutions in some countries at about the same time. The original ships on which people came to this country were quite small, especially during the colonial period. The early ships didn't have provision for steerage, so people had to stay in the hold or on the deck. After the War of 1812, some merchants in the Port of New York started to schedule sailings. Prior to that, ships didn't sail until they had a full complement of passengers or cargo, which could mean days of waiting to sail. This scheduling did eventually succeed, but it depended mainly on the highest paying passengers. The size of the ships increased over the years.

The Library has received some inquiries about illustrations of ships on which people's ancestors sailed. The earliest datable illustration is about 1843 of the

"Great Britain." There aren't any portrait photos of ships. At that time, sailing was disappearing, and steamships were coming in. Paintings were merely done for the ship's officers or for the captain, and these were passed down through their families. Some were ruined and thrown away. The Peabody-Essex Museum in Massachusetts has the largest collection of these images at the present time.

The last surviving immigrant ship surviving, the "Charles Cooper," is in the Falkland Islands, where it has been turned into a warehouse.

They began to advertise travel by packet ship, and schedules were printed up. The reputation for food, etc., on the sailing ships was very good. Bremen and Hamburg developed their own packet ships. They do have books on these ships. The newspapers of the time liked to depict the conditions in steerage. People slept on shelves on the side of the ship. There were three areas, for single women, single men, and families. The singles were on opposite sides, with the families in the middle. In the early days they had to bring their own food; the ship provided only read and water. There was communal cooking, mostly on brick hearths. In bad weather the hatches were "battened down," and the immigrants were closed inside. Cabin class was on the main deck, and was quite elegant.

Because it was news, most new ships were described in great detail when they were first built. Sailing ship hazards were very real. Cooking fires burned some ships. Disease, such as cholera, took its toll. Ships were at the mercy of the weather. They even warned parents with children to postpone their voyage when there were epidemics. The Captain was the only "doctor" aboard

A disaster occurred just below Quebec City, in the St. Lawrence River. A monument marks the spot. Thousands died from cholera. There is an area near Staten Island where passengers were met by Customs and quarantined. Before telegraph communication, semaphore was used to notify Customs that a ship was entering the harbor. Later, telegraph cabled was laid to Sandy Hook.

When the sailing ships came into South Street, there were unsavory characters awaiting the disembarking passengers. As a result, the immigrant groups formed "protection societies" to protect their own people who

came over the sea. Castle Garden, originally Fort Wadsworth, was established by the State of New York. There were immigration barges that escorted the immigrants from the pier to Castle Garden. Then ferries took them from Castle Garden to the railroad, or other means of transportation, to get them to their destination. There was even a certified employment agency there.

The first steamship to cross the Atlantic was the "Savannah", around 1812, but it proved to be impracticable. It was another twenty years before steamships appeared regularly on the Atlantic Ocean. They were mostly side-wheelers. It is unlikely that an ancestor traveled in a steamship before the 1850's.

The "SS City of Rome", owned by the Inman Line, was one of the larger ships. Steamships still carried sails, in case something broke down. There were steamship disasters as well. Most European ports used tenders to load the passengers, since they didn't tie up at a pier. Albert Ballau, a German genius, was the first agent to operate a fleet of ships filled with steerage passengers. He built the Hamburg-America line into one of the largest in the world. He actually built a villager in Hamburg for the immigrants, so they would have a place to stay before sailing. There was a race between the Germans and the British as to who would have the largest liners. Steerage conditions were improving. Ships were providing food and permanent bunks. Faster travel reduced the risk of disease. The quarantine hospital, originally near State Island, burned down several times. Eventually a special island was constructed to house the quarantine hospital.

In the 1980's the Federal Government built Ellis Island, originally a storage area for explosives. The first building, constructed of wood, burned down. First and Second class passengers usually did not go through Ellis Island. Because of Congressional limits, immigration declined a great deal in the 1940's, and Ellis Island was shut down. Even with a watchman on duty, the copper was stripped from everything. Restoration of the Island was begun in 1986, the 100th anniversary of the Statue of Liberty, but two thirds of the Island are still overgrown and not restored.

Mr. Brower showed slides and distributed handouts.

#### The Census Taker

Though really not much. When the questions were answered. His job there was done; So he mounted his horse and rode toward the sun. We can almost imagine his voice loud and clear: May God bless you all for another ten years. Now picture a time warp...it's now you and me; As we search for the people on our family tree. We squint at the census, and scroll down so slow: Could they only imagine on that long ago day. The entries they made would effect us this way? If they knew, would they wonder, At the yearning we feel; And the searching that makes them So increasingly real. We can hear, if we listen, the words they impart; Through their blood in our veins And their voice in our heart.

#### David R. & Margaret (Morton) BOGERT

David R. Bogert, Pvt., Corp., Revolutionary War Pension # W3502, Saratoga Co., NY, Common Pleas Court, 04 Sep 1832, David R. Bogert, age 70, a resident of Malta, Saratoga Co., NY. Born 3 Feb 1763, NYC, record at RDCNYC, father died 1814. Living at Hackensack, Bergen Co., NJ when called to service. Served under Capt. John Outwater, whose company was completely isolated and acted independently of all other troops. Also served under Lt. Adam Boyd, who is now age 86 and very sick, and was the sheriff of Bergen Co., NJ; Ensigns Abraham Allen, Abraham Huysman/ Houseman, John Terhune, who now lives at Detroit, MI. Lts. Weisenfels, Bagley, and Freligh/Froeligh, who were also my school mates. Served with Henry Denny, James Chappel, Morris Earl and Peter Allen. Quartermaster Clough pressed a quantity of grain from a farmer named Berry for use by our regiment. Taken prisoner by Buskirk's (\*regiment), along with Sgt. Smith and John Lozier in 1779, and put before Maj. Gen. Patterson at NYC. I was separated from John Lozier, who was taken to the Provost, kept by Cummingham, and I was taken to the Sugar House prison, kept by Lt./Sgt. Hutton. I Have lived at Kinderhook Preakness, Bergen Co., NJ, and Beekman, Dutchess Co., NY. I know Moses Williams who can testify as to my war service.

Orange Co., NY, Common Pleas Court, 29 Oct 1853. Margaret Bogert, daughter of the late John Morton, and the sister of Gen. Jacob Morton of NYC, age 82, widow of David R. Bogert, who died 30 Jun 1839 at Malta, Saratoga Co., NY. Married 05 Dec 1815 at the house of Rudolphus Bogert, NYC, by Rev. Steven Rowan.

Others mentioned in pension: Rev. Matthais Swain of Malta and Henry Dolittle of Ballston, Saratoga Co., NY, and Charles F., and George C. Morton, of Orange Co., NY

Testifying as fellow soldiers in the Revolution on 02 Jul 1832: Henry Berden, age 80, of Bergen Co., NJ and Sylvester Marius, of NYC.

Also served as a substitute for Roloff Demarest. My father, George Huyler. I also served with Samuel Demarest, Lt. Brockaway, (we called him "Brockleface"), Sgt. Joseph Demarest, and James Blauvelt, who was wounded in the arm. In the spring of 1797 I moved to Greenfield, Saratoga Co., NY; then in 1804 to Union, Broome Co., NY; then in June 1820 to Shippen Twp., Tioga Co., PA; then on 20 May 1831 to Harrison, Potter Co., PA. I also served in the war of 1812.

Westfield, Tioga Co., PA, widow of John G. Huyler, who died 10 Sep 1846 at Westfield, m. 10 May 1807, Burlington, Otsego Co., NY. My sister, Sally Butler, another sister, and two brothers who are all younger than me. are living in Painesville, Lake Co., Ohio.

Others mentioned in pension, George Huyler, son of John G. Huyler, age 62, a resident of Clymer, Indiana Co., (PA?) As of 05 Jul 1853. Benjamin B. Smith, age 62, a resident of Millsboro (?) As of 03 May 1853. Ansel Purple, Israel Greenlief, Ebenezer Jackson, Simeon Babcock.
