HAVERSTRAW BRICK MUSEUM

The program presented at the September 2002 meeting of the Genealogical Society at the New City Library dealt with the Haverstraw Brick Museum and the families involved.

Mrs. Patricia Gordon, director of the Brick

guest speaker for the evening. Pat outlined the
history of the brick industry and the many families
associated with its development.

A collection of 80 slides was shown of the Haverstraw area and the early brick yards located there. Pat spoke of an educational program being developed to introduce the younger school children to the art of producing bricks as they did at the turn of the century.

Pat Gordon suggested that she would welcome post cards, photographs and family history from those families around the country who experienced growing up in the Haverstraw area.

The Haverstraw Brick Museum is a growing institution, with new ideas being implemented and many volunteers being utilized to broaden the scope of the museum.

PETER REED and MARIA KROM

by D. Reid Ross

Peter Reed (Reid) (Ridt)

Son of John Ross and Margaret Hyman Born October 8, 1735, Islay, Scotland Married about 1763

Maria Krom (Crom)

Daughter of Dirck and Cataryn Crom Born: December 26, 1735 Died: After 1811

Maria Krom, daughter of Dirck and Catryn Crom, and great granddaughter of Floris Willemse Krom, married Peter Reed (Reid) (Read) (Ridt) about 1763. Peter's place of residence before his marriage was probably at Scotland Hill, in the Precinct of Haverstraw [now in the Village of Chestnut Ridge]. There is no record of their marriage since there is a break in the Tappan Church records from 1754 to 1784 due to a fire. The Tappan [Dutch] Church was the Krom family church. Their four daughters and three sons were all baptized in this church. They were: Maria (Mary) b. 1765; Catherine, b. 1767; Margaret, b. 1767; John, b. 1772; Jane, b. 1774; Peter, b. 1777; and Daniel Reed [my ancestor], born 5 August, 1779. Daniel Reed married Betthaiah (Metthia) Johnson in 1804, in Cambridge, Washington Co., NY.

Peter Reed was a weaver as early as 1767, when he bought a loom, a cow, and all household goods from Arthur Johnson, a weaver living at Haverstraw. Peter's wife Maria Kom was born and raised in Haverstraw. Peter served as constable and collector in 1764 in Haverstraw, as well as a road master and highway master in 1772,1781,1787,1791 and 1792.

In 1776 he enlisted in the Kakiat Company of the 2nd Regiment of Orange County Militia which saw action as shore guards and scouts along the west bank of the Hudson River. Later he served in a detachment of levies under Lt. Col. Gilbert Cooper.

By 1782 he had moved from Scotland Hill, and was living in New Hempstead when he mortgaged seventeen and one half acres, containing three parcels adjacent to and owned by the New Hempstead Presbyterian (English) Church, also known as the English Meeting House. Its mother church was founded in 1644 in Hempstead, Long Island, and is probably the oldest continuing Presbyterian Church in the United States. Like all early Presbyterian churches in the U.S., it had its origins in the emigration of Scots and Ulster Scots of Northern Ireland.

New Hempstead (earlier known as Kakiat, since 1829 as Ramapo) was settled in 1713 by a company of

English colonists, largely from Hempstead, Long
Island. The church was founded in 1754 in the Kakiat
Patent. It was located on the Old Kings Road about
midway between Scotland Hill and the Kings Ferry on
the Hudson River. A north-south road intersected the
Old Kings Road, adjacent to the church and a log
schoolhouse.

When the British occupied Long Island in 1776, a number of patriots, mostly Presbyterian, abandoned their homes. Some who were living in the original Hempstead town on Long Island moved to New Hempstead to escape British rule.

Among the first deacons and elders of the church were Jonah and Timothy Halstead, and Samuel Coe. Coe donated the land on which the church was built. The Clarkstown Town Clerk records indicate that in 1791 Peter Reed was road master "from John Coe's property (his neighbor and grand nephew of Samuel Coe) to the head of the mountain," toward Scotland Hill. In 1794 Peter Reeds property was assessed at 63 pounds for tax purposes.

Elections were held at town meetings at his house to vote on establishing a poor house in 1796 in Clarkstown; in 1797 to authorize the raising of 300 pounds to finance it; and in 1798 to raise an additional 300 pounds for poor relief.

Peter Reed was an "organizing member" of the New Hempstead Church in 1785 and was listed seventh on its membership roll of only twenty-three that year. He rented its parsonage from 1791 to 1797 when there was no resident pastor and while the church was being rebuilt. John D. Coe served as clerk and treasurer of the church for fifty years beginning in 1785.

Peter Reed and John D. Coe (his friend, fellow church member, neighbor and executor of his estate) were two of the three trustees of the Clarkstown School in 1796-1797 near their church. State legislation passed in 1795 provided partial funding of schools providing local communities raised one-half of the state appropriation. It also provided for local election of school commissioners.

John Coe also had served as an ensign in Peter Reed's militia regiment. He also kept a tavern and store on the northwest corner of the road opposite the church, on Lot 4 of the 100 acre lots in the Kakiat Patent. During the revolution the tavern was a convenient way station for officers and couriers passing through. On at least two occasions troops camped in the immediate vicinity. Major John Andre had dinner there on his way to Tappan to be tried for treason. During the revolution the county supervisors sometimes convened their meetings in the tavern or the church.

John D. Coe was a member of the Provincial Congress in 1775, and a judge of the county court at that time. In 1775 and 1778-1780 he was a member of the New York State Assembly, and was a State senator from 1795-1798. John D. Coe also served as Chaplain in the 2nd Regiment, Orange County Militia, Captain Johnson's Company. His wife was Mary Halstead. Peter Reed served in a different company of the same regiment.

The Reed children attended the Clarkstown School. The log schoolhouse was built about 1774 near the church, and the church was undoubtedly responsible for running the school. The teacher was George Douglas, presumably an Englishman. After 1795 the school received state aid as a common school.

Peter Reed appears as head of household in the 1790, 1800 and 1810 census of Rockland County. His immediate neighbors in 1800 were Benjamin Halstead and Jonas Halstead. In 1784, Thomas Halstead posted a bond on the mortgage against property that Peter Reed purchased in 1782.

On November 9, 1807, Peter sold sixty acres of land he owned in Washington County, NY, to his son Daniel (who lived there) for \$1.00. Daniel died in the war of 1812. The deed was witnessed by John D. Coe. Peter had inherited this land from his father John, who had been awarded Lot 70 of the Argyle Patent that was granted to Lachlan Campbell by the NY Colonial government.

Peter's will, probated January 10, 1811, in New Hempstead, left his estate to his wife Mary (Maria); his two daughters, Mary and Margaret; and the minor children of his deceased son John (who had died by July 20, 1810). By 1811, John's widow (Thankful) had married Abraham Jones and was recorded as a member of the New Hempstead Church.

No record has been found as to when Maria Reed died, or where she is buried, but she obviously survived him, since she was named in his will. There are no burial records for wether Peter Reed or his wife Mary. It is possible, however, that they are buried in an unmarked grave in the Coe family cemetery about 1/2 mile north of their church.

Peter's daughter Margaret, who had married David Halstead, was undoubtedly the namesake of Margaret Halstead Reid (b. 8 November 1805), who was one of Peter's grandchildren, the daughter of his son Daniel. Margaret Halstead Reid married Charles Wesley Ross on 19 September, 1830, and continued our line of descent.

According to family legend, Margaret Reid Ross kept a "patch-work quilt" made of pieces of woolen uniforms worn in various wars by soldiers in her family, beginning with the French and Indian War. It also included pieces of uniforms worn by her four sons who fought in the Civil War. At least two of Peter's grandchildren fought in the War of 1812, and at least four of his great grandchildren in the Civil War.

This lends credence to the family legend that a member of her family fought with General Wolfe in Quebec, who was killed in 1759 on the Plains of Abraham. Margaret also was as rock-ribbed a Presbyterian of her day as she could be, and maintained family discipline as strictly as a mother of six could possibly do. This included allowing no card playing in her house and no dancing. No cooking was allowed on Sunday.

Margaret Reid Ross died on 25 March, 1892, in Hedgeville, West Virginia, at the home of her son, Dr. Daniel Reid Ross, where she had lived as a widow for twenty five years. She was 84 years old, blind, and partially paralyzed. She was known in the community as "Mother Ross," according to the *Martinsburg Herald*, which carried a front page story on her death.

MORE ABOUT WILLIAM CONKLIN

Last month's newsletter carried an abstract of the Bergen Co., NJ, Rev. War Pension application of William Conklin. GSRC member M. Smeltzer Stevenot provides us here with more information about this early Rocklander.

Williams first Rockland ancestors were Mathias Conklin, b. c/1698, will proved Orangetown 1776, and Sophia Mabie, b. New Rochelle, d/o Casper Mabie. They were married in Hackensack RDC, NJ. He was head of a family in Orangetown in 1771.

Mathias was the son of Deliverance Conklin and Angeltie Buckout, d/o Mathias Buckout and Eleanor Ellsworth, and great grandson of John and Helena Conklin of Rye, NY. William's father, Abraham, was b. 1725, married Margrietje Bell, b. c/1727, d/o William Bell and Lea Blauvelt, in 1750 in Schraalenburg, NJ. Their son William was a freeholder from 1786 to 1794, moved to Franklin Township, NJ, in 1797. His son Benjamin, b. 1791, married Jemima (Dater?), b. 1795. They had children William J., b. c/1817-1820, and Elsie Jane who married William Holmes of NYC in 1852 at Zion Lutheran Church, Saddle River, NJ. William married Ann Eliza Dater, d/o John Dater and Maria Bush. Ann Eliza inherited a large farm in Tallman, NY, from her great grandfather Derrick Bush. Conklin descendants still live on the family property in Tallman.

Harmanus and Rachel Bogert VanHuysen/VanHousen

Harmanus VanHuysen, Captain, NJ Militia, Revolutionary War Pension #W16772. Albany County, NY, Common Pleas Court, 4 Aug 1832, Harmanus VanHuysen, age 79, a resident of *Bethlehem, Albany Co.*, NY; b. 23 Oct 1752, Tappan, NY, record at Tappan RDC. Lived in Hackensack, Bergen Co., NJ, when entered service in 1775, age 22.

I served with Lt. James Bogert, Ens. Peter Vreeland. My commission as a Captain was signed in 1776, by Jacobus Demarest, then the President of the Committee to Grant Commissions. I commenced the study of divinity in 1783 under Rev. Soloman Froeleigh and was licensed and resided in Bergen Co., NJ. In 1794 I was called to the Bethlehem RDC, in Albany Co., NY.

I knows the following men who can testify as to my war service.: Samuel G. Verbryck, of Rockland Co., NY, Rev. Thomas Holiday, of Minisink, Orange Co., NY, John Ward Jr., of Bethlehem, Samuel Demarest, of Waterford, NY, Samuel Vervalen, of Orange, Rockland Co., NY, Rev. Abraham Fort (Ford?), and John Taylor, both of New Scotland, Albany Co., NY.

Albany Co., NY, Common Pleas Court, 4 May 1837, Rachael VanHuysen, age 76, formerly Bogert, the d/o James Bogert, of Hackensack, Bergen Co., NJ, a resident of Albany Co., NY, widow of Harmanus VanHuysen, who died at 1:00 am on 26 Nov 1833, age 82 years, 1 month and 3 days, at New Scotland, Albany Co., NY, married 27 Dec 1778 by Rev. Benjamin Vanderlinda at Paramus RDC.

guard and scout in Bergen Co., NJ. Encountered Col. Buskirk
and Bartley's men. Taken prisoner by British soldiers on a
barge from one of the British ships near Nyack, NY, to the
prison ship "Jersey."

Rockland Co., NY, Common Pleas Court, 21 Sept 1838, Leah Ackerson, age 72, a resident of Orange, Rockland Co., NY, formerly Leah Bell, widow of Derick Ackerson, also know as Ekkerson or Acker, who died 20 Nov 1836, married 23 Nov 1785, by Rev. Nicholas Lansing at the United Conggregation of Tappan and Clarkstown (marriage record states Dirk Ekkerson).

Others mentioned in pension (no relationship stated); 21 Sep 1838, Catherine Ackerson, of Orange. Rev. Isaac D. Cole, 21 Dec 1833, Samuel G. VerBryck, Isaac T. Blanch, both of Orange, Adolphus L. Mabie, *Justice of the Peace*, Rev. John Demarest of NYC, formerly of Orange.

Testifying as fellow soldiers in the revolution, 29 Nov 1832, John Hutton, of Clarkstown, and Abraham Conklin, of Orange, 07 Dec 1833, Abraham VanHouten, John VanHouten, age 76, both of Clarkstown, John G. Bogert, age 78, of Orange. Mentioned in court papers, the pension case of Elizabeth Hendrickson. Copy of a transcript from the pension office, dated 6 Jul 1928, "send copies of pension record to (unnamed), also see receipt of Israel Aber, W16800".

It goes to deep pride that they fought to make and keep us a Nation. It goes to a deep and immense understanding that they were doing it for us.

That we might be born who we are. That we might remember them. So we do.

With love and caring and scribing each fact of their existence, because we are them and they are us.

I tell the story of my family. It is up to that one called in the next generation to answer the call and take their place in the long line of family storytellers.

That is why I do my family genealogy, and that is what calls those young and old to step up and put flesh on the bones.

Carlough and his wife, Maria May, or the grandparents of the ten children in column three.


At the top of the second column is shown David J. Carlough and Maria May, the progenitors of this Carlough family.

The third column shows the 10 children of David and Maria (marked by a black dot) in the order of their birth, with the top of the box for the direct descendant, and directly below their spouse. The horizontal line indicates the union of the two. Their birth and death dates are shown in each box.

The fourth column is for miscellaneous info such as their marriage, baptism, burial etc., and where to obtain further information on <u>their</u> children and grandchildren.

To the left of each of these children are the parents of the marriage partner, called in-laws. They are shown in the second column, as an older generation.
